These services from Renville County include:

- Emergency response services
- Law enforcement protection and judicial services
- A maintained network of roadways and bridges
- Protective services for children and aging adults
- Physical and mental health resources
- Services to veterans and their families
- Licensing and vital records services
- Real estate recording
- Recycling and waste disposal services

*The daily cost was determined by dividing the total levy by population and then by days in one year.

2020 Preliminary Levy: \$14,933,817

(a 3.29% increase)

Approximately 2% of this increase is designated to fund future road improvements.

Public Safety 14.6%

7,288 cases handled by the Sheriff's Office in 2018 - 20 Events/Day. 6,104 911 calls were answered by dispatch. Average daily jail population was 57.3 inmates, with 32.8 boarded for other jurisdictions.

Road & Bridge 29.5%

Major projects completed in 2019 include repaving 10.5 miles of roads and replacing 10 bridges. Eight bridges will be replaced in 2020.

Parks and Libraries 1.3%

Public Health 6.9%

In 2018, Public Health completed 2,228 family home visits, 3,784 home health care and aide visits, and 1,346 case management visits for elderly and disabled individuals.

Recycling/Landfill/HHW 2.6%

In 2018, the Redwood-Renville Regional Material Recovery Facility (RRRMRF) processed 3,472 tons of recyclables, 343 tons of appliances and electronics, 226 tons of tires, 160 tons of Household Hazardous Waste, and 1.5 tons of fluorescent bulbs.

Human Services 20.3%

There are three primary service areas: social services, child support and public assistance. 366 Child Protection reports were submitted during 2018.

Conservation of Natural Resources 5.1%

Extension, agricultural inspection and water planning.

General Government 14.4%

County Board, Administration, Auditor-Treasurer, Assessor, County Attorney, Recorder, Environmental Services, Veterans Services, License department, and Restorative Justice.

Capital Improvements 5.3%

The proposed Capital Improvements and Bond Funds budget is \$2.2 million.


The Economic Development Authority (EDA) has a separate levy, with a proposed 2020 budget of \$464,817.

Health and Home Safety

MnCHOICES Assessments are conducted by a Public Health Nurse and/or Social Worker who helps Renville County residents and their families determine if community living (ex. staying in their home) is the appropriate choice to meet their needs.

Human Services and Public Health currently provide Care Coordination to 427 elderly and disabled individuals.

Veterans Services

In 2019, there were 57 outreach visits throughout the county and over 500 office visits so far! We have also provided transportation to medical visits for 137 county veterans during the first eight months of 2019.

County Parks

There are seven County parks, which include 1,300 acres of parkland featuring primitive stands of trees, wildflowers and native prairies. There is never a charge for visiting the parks, but there is an overnight camping fee.

The above map shows the planned road and bridge construction projects that are currently part of the county's five-year plan.


