Restorative Justice: Volunteers Needed

estorative Justice is a fundamental change in approach when working to repair damages caused from crimes or wrongdoings within a community. This is not only a restorative philosophy but a way of life that emphasizes the need to restore the relationships harmed in these situations.

What is a Circle? The Circle process is an intentional way of gathering and organizing effective group communication, building relationships, establishing accountability, problem solving, and healthy decision making. As a group, members work with the family or individual to determine what they can do to repair the harm they have caused by the circumstances that brought them to Circle.



As of January 2021, there are seven Circles being facilitated within Renville County. Circles generally meet on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday beginning at Noon and 5:30p.m. While in Circle participants and volunteers discuss what is going well, what is not going well, and potential next steps to head in the right direction

"By volunteers sharing their life experiences and telling their own stories, participants begin to open up to the group which establishes trust; and through these relationships that are formed, healthy changes begin to unfold." shared Andrew Peltz, Restorative Justice Coordinator.

Volunteers are needed

There is a great need for community connection, support, and accountability in Renville County. This is exactly what the Restorative Justice Department aims to provide. The reality is the number of youth, young adults, and families in need of support are certainly not declining. More volunteers mean more Circles and families can be involved in the program. In the midst of COVID, a majority of Circles are being held virtually via Zoom.

Volunteer Guardians Needed in Renville County

Renville County is looking for individuals willing to serve as a volunteer guardian to those in need!

A guardian is a person appointed by the court to make personal decisions for the person subject to guardianship. They have the authority to make decisions on behalf of the person, which may include where to live, medical decisions, training, education, etc.

The person subject to guardianship lacks sufficient understanding or capacity to make or communicate responsible personal decisions and has an inability to meet personal needs for medical care, nutrition, clothing, shelter, or safety.

A guardian must complete certain tasks such as submitting timely annual reports, serve copies of paperwork annually, attend team meetings and complete a criminal background study. A monthly stipend is provided to guardians.

Open Your Heart. Open Your Home. Steps to Become a Foster Parent

Foster parents are as unique and diverse as any other family! A foster parent may be single or married, have children or not have children, rent or own their home, work full-time or not full-time. What they share is a concern for children and a commitment to help them through tough times.



STEPS TO BECOME A FOSTER PARENT:

1) Contact Renville County Human Services at 320-523-2202. Ask for the Foster Care Licensor.

2) Complete Application and Fact Sheet:

• Forms can be obtained by calling Renville County Human Services at 320-523-2202.

3) Initiate Background Study:

 A background study is required for everyone in your home 13 years of age and older.

4) Open Home for Visit and Study:

 You will be assigned a social worker who will visit you and your family for an interview and to complete a home study assessment.

5) Receive Foster Care License:

• When you have successfully completed the process, a license will be issued. This license is good for one or two years.

6) Participate in Training:

• Trainings give potential and current foster parents the tools to have a successful foster care experience.

COVID-19 Vaccines: Debunking the Myths

A Message from Renville County Public Health

OVID-19 vaccine has been called a "game changer" and the entire process is a win. This vaccine is going to save lives. The vaccines are essentially 100 percent effective against serious disease.

There's a lot of information swirling about the COVID-19 vaccines but not all of it is true. The following myths and facts address some of the top questions related to the COVID-19 vaccines.

MYTH: This vaccine was developed in record time, which means safety and efficacy are in question

We know more about this virus and vaccine, scientifically, than any other vaccine in history. From both a science and safety standpoint, experts believe this is going to be exceptionally safe.

The regulatory process in the United States is unrivaled. In a heavily regulated process with lots of bureaucracy, the urgency helped. Funding helped vaccine companies run testing and production at the same time, which speeded up the availability of vaccine.

Both Pfizer and Moderna have run tests on many people. An FDA analysis of the vaccine's safety and effectiveness on people age 16 and older found "no specific safety concerns" that would preclude the vaccine's use.

FACT: I will need more than one shot

The Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine contains two doses that are to be administered 21 days apart for individuals who are at least 16 years old. The Moderna vaccine contains two doses that are to be administered 28 days apart for those at least 18 years old. We are waiting to learn more information regarding other vaccine companies.

MYTH: This vaccine changes your DNA

The COVID-19 vaccine uses messenger RNA to trigger an immune response. According to medical experts, this vaccine does nothing to alter or impact your DNA. This vaccine is a way to code for a protein, just as you would if you get any other



infection. We're tricking the body into doing it without getting the infection. This is absolutely as close to anything we could make to what your body would do naturally.

FACT: I will not get COVID-19 from this vaccine

For this vaccine in particular, we're talking about a vaccine that has no virus in it, not dead or alive. It's a message to your immune system about what to look out for. When we get sick, some of you feeling sick is from the virus or bacteria and the other part of it is just your body doing its job. When you get a vaccine and you feel achy, that means your immune system works. It's doing what it does when it's threatened.

MYTH: This vaccine contains egg protein

While most conventional vaccines — including the flu shot — are made with egg protein, the coronavirus vaccine has no trace of nuts, eggs, or any food.

FACT: The most common reaction is pain at the injection site

According to the FDA's report, 84% of any adverse reactions among participants included pain at the injection site.

Additionally, 62% of participant reactions were fatigue, 55% included a headache, and less than 40% included muscle pain, chills, joint pain, and fever. Severe adverse reactions occurred in less than 4.6% of participants more frequently after the second dose than the first.

MYTH: This vaccine could make women infertile


There is no indication whatsoever that this vaccine would affect the fertility of females or that it would have other long-term effects.

FACT: The vaccine is not 100% effective against the disease.

The Moderna and Pfizer vaccines have effectiveness rates of about 95 percent after two doses. That's on par with vaccines for chickenpox and measles. However, like the flu vaccine, COVID-19 vaccines prevent severe COVID cases if you happen to contract the disease.

MYTH: I've already had COVID-19 so I don't need the vaccine

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention encourage vaccination even if you've already had the virus. Some people don't develop a durable immune response when they get the virus, and we don't know if the immunity after getting the virus is going to decrease over time. Getting the vaccine is one way we can make sure somebody is walking around knowing they're immune, rather than thinking they're immune and could possibly get sick again.



MYTH: I don't need to wear a face mask once I've been vaccinated

Health care leaders still recommend wearing a mask after getting the vaccine, especially as new variants emerge. In an effort to decrease overall spread into 2021, wearing a face mask along with social distancing are some ways to avoid virus droplets from entering the body. As more of the population gets vaccinated in 2021, the level of immunity will increase and spread of the virus will begin to decrease.

Renville County Assessor's Office: Notice of Valuation and Classification

The Renville County Assessor's Office maintains records on the physical characteristics of each property in the county. This includes analyzing your property's location, amount of land you own, square footage of improvements, and the quality of construction. As required by state law, the Assessor's Office is responsible for recording any changes to your property as well.

Appraisers from the Assessor's Office verify classification of properties -- whether a property is classified as residential, commercial, or agricultural, for example. Renville County Appraisers are also responsible for maintaining homestead records and receiving and processing homestead applications.



The Assessor's Office uses sales data to estimate the market value of properties on the assessment date of January 2 each year. Each spring, you will be mailed a Notice of Valuation and Classification. This notice will inform you of the market value and the classification of your property. If you have any questions regarding your property's value, classification, or homestead status, please contact the Assessor's Office at 320-523-3645.

CodeRED Emergency Notification Service

CodeRED is a FREE emergency notification service provided to all residents within Renville County that will notify you of emergency situations and information through phone calls to your home and/or cell phones, text messages, and emails.

The system is used to keep you informed of local events that may immediately impact your safety, including dangerous weather, if you prefer. As a local resident, Renville County encourages you to take action and register your home and cell phones for this service and verify your home location during the enrollment process so we may target notifications that directly impact your home or business.



Renville County Sheriff Scott Hable encourages all Renville County citizens to enroll to receive free CodeRED Warnings. "The CodeRED system provides our county with numerous benefits; we use it to keep our residents informed by issuing general and emergency related messages. CodeRED Weather Warning is an additional tool that we use to help keep our citizens safe and to provide them with additional time to prepare during severe weather events," Sheriff Hable said.

If you subscribed to CodeRED prior to May 2020, YOU MUST RE-ENROLL TO RECEIVE THESE IMPORTANT WEATHER ANNOUNCEMENTS! This required re-enrollment is due to a CodeRED system enhancement that took place last year. The enrollment/re-enrollment process will allow you to choose which events you'd like to be notified about.

ALL RESIDENTS LIVING IN RENVILLE COUNTY ARE ENCOURAGED TO ENROLL VIA ONE OF THE FOLLOWING METHODS:

- 1. Visit www.renvillecountymn.com/sheriff. Click on the "CodeRED Community Notification" tab in the lower right of the website to enroll using your home and cell phone numbers, text and email addresses.
- 2. Text the word "RENVILLE" to 99411 from your smartphone. A sign-up link will immediately be sent to you.
- 3. Call the Renville County Sheriff's Office at 320-523-1161 and someone will assist you in getting enrolled.

Housing Committee Formed to Address Health and Housing Needs in Renville County



enville County was selected (based on a submitted application) to participate in the National Association of Counties (NACo) 2019/2020 Housing and Health Action Learning Cohort. This program supported the county in exploration, learning and action to help understand

the impact of housing quality, stability, and affordability on county health outcomes. Cohort activities were aimed at equipping county officials and staff with the information necessary to make informed decisions towards better housing and health for their residents.

After completion of the program, team members saw value in continuing to explore health and housing issues in Renville County. This lead the Renville County HRA/EDA to form a Housing Committee.

The mission of this committee is "To facilitate partnerships in the areas of housing and health equity in order to create a thriving community for our neighbors to live, learn, work and play."

Committee members are comprised of individuals representing the HRA/EDA Board, County Board of Commissioners, Housing Authority, Economic Development Authority, Public Health, Administration, United Community Action Partnership (UCAP), Olivia Hospital & Clinics, a local developer or realtor, a landlord with low income tenants and a large employer representative.

Housing Committee Goals include:

- Address two major social determinants of health: housing and poverty.
- Acknowledge that jobs and housing are interdependent.
- Address the lack of available housing for all income levels and family compositions.
- Promote community investment.
- Find alternatives to current model of mobile home park operation.
- Research and maximize funding opportunities.


Low-Interest Loan Programs for Well and Septic Improvements



Renville County administers low-interest loan programs to assist property owners with upgrading or replacing a failing septic system or for repairing or replacing a damaged, noncompliant, or contaminated well. Loan terms are for 10 years with an interest rate and fees totaling 3%. This loan amount is added to property taxes as a special assessment with payment due twice a year along with property taxes. The application process is simple, and the loan can be paid in full at any time.

Renville County Accepting Grant Applications to Address Aquatic Invasive Species

Renville County is accepting grant funding requests for innovative ideas relating to aquatic invasive species prevention, detection, management, and leadership. Funding requests are open to all Renville County residents, service and non-profit organizations, public and private schools, and local units of government.



There is no minimum or maximum grant funding amount that can be requested. Grant funding allocations may vary based on funding availability and number of applications received.

What are Aquatic Invasive Species?

Aquatic invasive species (AIS) are nonnative plants, animals, or pathogens that live primarily in water and thrive in their new environment, often out-competing native species. In Minnesota there are many aquatic invasive plants and animals. Well known AIS include: zebra mussels, curly-leaf pondweed, Eurasian watermilfoil, and carp.

Morton Gneiss

n Morton, Minnesota lies a very special type of rock; the old and beautiful Morton Gneiss, named after the town. Gneiss is a metamorphic rock with a banded or foliated structure and a typical composition of quartz, mica, and feldspar. When either a sedimentary or igneous rock containing these minerals goes under

extreme heat and pressure, it then becomes the metamorphic rock known as gneiss.



Not only is Morton Gneiss a rare type of rock that is only found in the Minnesota River Valley, but the rock itself is also one of the oldest dating rocks at around 3.5 billion years old. The reason we are able to witness this old rock is because, approximately 100 hundred million years ago, geologic forces pushed the gneiss up near the Earth's surface. A vast body of water known as Lake Agassiz formed in southern Canada, Minnesota, and North Dakota. When that water drained to the south, forming the River Warren, it carved out the Minnesota River Valley. This powerful flow washed away hundreds of feet of glacial deposits and exposed some of the Morton Gneiss.

What makes Morton Gneiss so special and unique, other than it being some of the oldest dated rock in the world, is that when it becomes cut and polished the different colored swirls and bands of pink, black, and gray with flecks of white give the impression of a galaxy.

Workers began to quarry Morton Gneiss around 1884. It became very popular for architectural uses in buildings due to its visual appeal. Being durable and tough like granite, it was primarily used for more decorative purposes such as flooring. It enjoyed its greatest popularity in the 1920s and 1930's during the Art Deco Era.

Architectural uses of this rock can be found around the country in places such as New York, Detroit, Des Moines, Milwaukee, Brooklyn, and Washington. Since the mid-twentieth century, Morton Gneiss has been used more for grave markers and mausoleums than for buildings. At the Bird Island Cemetery, in Goodhue County, a free-standing arch of Morton Gneiss greets visitors.

In Morton, the town's welcome signs are made of Gneiss, as are the panels on the old high school. The stone is so plentiful there that it is used as riprap (erosion-reducing rubble) along ditches and streams. Zion Lutheran Church may be the only building made entirely of Morton Gneiss. The State of Minnesota designated a huge outcrop of the stone, in Morton, the Morton Outcrops Scientific and Natural Area. Visitors there can see Minnesota's oldest rocks, eroded but unquarried. 


