Renville County Environmental Services Now Offering NEW Income-Based Septic System Grant Program



enville County Environmental Services is pleased to announce the availability of a NEW incomebased grant program that is available to property owners in Renville County that have an existing noncompliant septic system. Funds are intended to fix septic systems that are currently failing codes or functionality. These dollars are made possible through grants received from the Minnesota Board of Water & Soil Resources (BWSR) and Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA).

There is a limited amount of funding available and funds will be distributed in the order the applications are received.

Minimum Grant Qualifications:

- Funding must be for a homesteaded single-family home with an existing, failing subsurface sewage treatment system (SSTS) in Renville County
- The applicant must be the owner of the property
- Taxes must be current
- Financial qualifications:

Minnesota Board of Water & Soil Resources (BWSR) Funds (based on 300% of the 2021 Federal Poverty Guidelines) - not to exceed the lesser of \$5,000 or 35% of the cost to upgrade the SSTS.

AND/OR

Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) Funds (based on HUD's low-income guidelines) – If the applicant qualifies for both grants, under no circumstances shall the total grant money awarded exceed 50% or 75% of the cost to upgrade the SSTS, whichever is applicable according to income limits below.

Planning on a Watershed Scale

enville County's water takes another step forward towards being cleaner and healthier through the One Watershed, One Plan (1W1P) Initiative. **1W1P** is Watershed

Based Implementation Funding (WBIF) that seeks to align local water planning on watershed boundaries, rather than county boundaries. This planning effort and goals of installing Best Management Practices (BMP's) to improve water quality are made possible by the Clean Water Land and Legacy Amendment that was passed in 2008.

The green highlighted part of Map 1 (below) of Renville County is known as the Central Minnesota River Watershed Partnership (CMRWP). While a large part of the county is involved in this watershed, the partnership encompasses parts of five counties (Chippewa, Kandiyohi, Nicollet, Renville, and Sibley) and is nearly 1,262 square miles. The CMRWP is a partnership of counties and Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) within the watershed.

The CMRWP put together a plan that seeks to understand, improve, and protect the surface and groundwater resources of the watershed and its neighbors. High priorities were designated in this process as impaired lakes and streams, altered hydrology, soil erosion, and sediment loss, agricultural practices and runoff management, recreation, drinking water protection, and education and outreach.

The plan summarized existing scientific data about the water resources within the watershed and proposes implementation projects, data collection needs, and the creation of a watershed-wide civic engagement and outreach program.

On January 26, 2022, the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) approved the CMRWP plan. With the plan being approved, projects that target those in high-priority designated areas throughout the CMRWP planning area potentially will be eligible for funding. Funding will be available later in 2022. This includes, but is not limited to, water and sediment control basins, cover crops, and grade stabilization projects throughout Renville County.

The planning process began in December 2021 for the South Fork of the Crow River 1W1P, Map 2 (above). The process that was completed for the CMRWP, will be completed for the South Fork of the Crow River as well.

Low-Interest Loan Programs for Septic and Well Improvements



Renville County administers low-interest loan programs to assist property owners with:

- Upgrading or replacing a failing septic system
- Repairing/replacing a damaged or contaminated well

Loan terms are for 10 years with interest rate and fees totaling 3%. This loan amount is added to property taxes as a special assessment with payment due twice a year along with property taxes. The application process is simple, and the loan can be paid in full at any time.

Residential Recycling Carts and Rural Recycling Sites See Many Abuses:

Do Your Part. Use Your Cart.

n the summer of 2015, West Central Sanitation distributed a 95-gallon recycling cart to every city residence and business in Renville County. Each cart was individually coded and assigned to a specific address for the use of collecting recyclables. These 95-gallon carts provide a more convenient way to recycle, both in storage and capacity and ease of hauling recycling to the curb. The carts also provide easier collection for the hauler.

For township residents located outside city limits, we have established Rural Recycling Drop-Off Sites. These sites are located in almost every community in Renville County. Information as to what is considered acceptable to recycle, as well as what is unacceptable, is located on the side of the 8-yard dumpster and is posted on a sign at the sites.

AS A CITY RESIDENT OR BUSINESS, WHY CAN'T I DROP OFF RECYCLING AT THE RURAL RECYCLING DROP-OFF SITE IN MY COMMUNITY?

Almost weekly, the Redwood-Renville Regional Solid Waste Authority (RRRSWA) is contacted by either city staff or rural residents concerning city residents and/or businesses, who continue filling up the Rural Recycling Drop-Off Sites. A NOTICE sign is posted at each Drop-Off Site that states that the site is for RURAL RESIDENTS ONLY.



Although the intention to recycle is a good one, the reality is that when a city resident or business chooses to use the drop-off site instead of their recycling cart (or alternative), they are hindering rural residents' ability to recycle. Unfortunately, rural residents cannot use their drop-off location when the bins are full. When the rural sites are used by non-rural

residents or businesses, it frequently results in an overflow of materials which are then often placed on the ground, causing an even bigger problem with litter and unhappy neighbors, city, and/or county workers, who must pick up the mess. The problem is further compounded by people unwilling to break down cardboard boxes, thus reducing disposal space even further.

WHERE IS THE EASIEST PLACE TO FIND INFORMATION TO DETERMINE WHAT IS RECYCLABLE IN RENVILLE COUNTY?

Recycling information is listed on the top of your 95-gallon recycling cart, as well as on the sign at the Rural Recycling Sites. There are many food, beverage, and material packages that LOOK LIKE they COULD BE recyclable, but are NOT, and are therefore considered GARBAGE. People who knowingly, or unknowingly, place items into recycling receptacles that are not recyclable, HOPING that they can be recycled, are known as "wish cyclers." Sadly, each year we are finding more and more non-recyclable items being thrown into their recycling, when they should be placed into their garbage.

WHAT DO I DO WITH NON-RECYCLABLE ITEMS (GARBAGE)?



Items that are non-recyclable go into your household/business garbage. For items too large to fit, please consider bringing these items to the nearest Municipal Solid Waste (MSW) Landfill or bring it to the Redwood-Renville Regional Material Recovery and Transfer Facility (RRRMRF) in Redwood Falls. We accept: furniture, couches, chairs, love seats, mattresses/box springs,

etc., as well as large home cleanouts. Call for details, facility hours, and restrictions.



Leaves and grass clippings should be composted or brought to your local tree or brush site. They do not belong in recycling.



Plastic toys and/or furniture should be placed in the garbage. Freezers should be disposed of at a special county collection day. (See page 11 of newsletter)

WHAT CAN I DO IF I OWN A BUSINESS AND HAVE MORE RECYCLING THAN FITS IN MY CART?

We appreciate your business choosing to recycle! Below are a few options to help you meet your recycling needs:

- 1. As a business in city limits, you are allowed to receive one (1) 95-gallon curbside recycling cart at no cost, for your business recyclables. Your location would be added to the regular curbside collection and would be collected every other week with the city curbside recycling route. If you choose this option, please call the RRRSWA Office to make arrangements.
- 2. If a 95-gallon cart is not large enough for your business recycling, you can call West Central Sanitation at 1-800-246-7630 and arrange for an additional cart or recycling dumpster to be placed at your business location. There is a charge for this service. Talk to another business to see if they would be interested in sharing the recycling dumpster and splitting the cost.
- 3. If you have a large quantity of cardboard or other recyclables, consider bringing your recyclable materials directly to the Redwood-Renville Regional Material Recovery Facility (RRRMRF) located on the west end of Redwood Falls. Roll-off containers are accessible 24/7 to dispose of recyclables and are available to businesses, as well as ALL RESIDENTS (city and rural).

Restorative Justice is a fundamental change in approach when working to repair damages caused from crimes or wrongdoings within a community. This is not only a restorative philosophy but a way of life that emphasizes the need to restore the relationships harmed in these situations.



What is a Circle? The Circle process is an intentional way of gathering and organizing effective group communication, building relationships, establishing accountability, problem solving, and healthy decision making. As a group, members work with the family or individual to determine what they can do to repair the harm they have caused by the circumstances that brought them to Circle. While in Circle participants and volunteers discuss what is going well, what is not going well, and potential next steps to head in the right direction.

This is a great way to get involved with people in your community or the one down the road. The need for connection, support and mentoring continues to grow as evidenced by the times we are in. With that comes the reality that the number of youth, and families in need of extra support are certainly not declining. Minnesota Supplemental Aid



Minnesota Supplemental Aid provides monthly cash support to help meet basic living expenses. **It is mainly for people who receive Supplemental Security Income**, but if your income is just over the Supplemental Security Income limit, you may be eligible for Minnesota Supplemental Aid.

Typical monthly benefit

Minnesota Supplemental Aid can help you pay for basic living expenses like clothing, utilities, and housing. The specific amount you receive may vary depending on your situation. The typical monthly benefit is:

A single person

Up to \$81 a month

Couples

Up to \$111 a month

A person living in a facility

Up to \$81 a month

Applying for MSA

You can apply for Minnesota Supplemental Aid by mail, phone, in person, or online. Apply for aid at the same time you apply for Supplemental Security Income so it can start as soon as your Supplemental Security Income starts. To apply you must:

- Fill out a Combined Application Form, available at your local human services office (located in the Government Services Center at 105 South 5th Street, Olivia, MN 56277) or request one to be mailed (by calling 320-523-2202), and return the form right away. **Or, apply online at mnbenefits.mn.gov.**
- Meet with an Eligibility Worker, which can be completed by phone, and give information about yourself. During this meeting, ask any questions you have about the forms or program.
- Provide proof of the information the county asks for.

Get help applying

It can be hard to apply for benefits on your own. Disability Hub MN can connect you with someone who will help with your application or appeal if you have been denied. This help is free. **Contact Disability Hub MN at 866-333-2466** and tell them you need help applying for Supplemental Security Income and Minnesota Supplemental Aid.

- It may take more than 30 days if the county needs proof of a disability or other information. If you are eligible, payments will begin right away. The county will send you a letter notifying you of its decision. If you cannot receive benefits, you may appeal or apply again at any time, especially if your situation changes.
- If the county determines that you are eligible for Minnesota Supplemental Aid, your benefits will begin the first day of the month the county receives your application.

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Radon in Homes:

Protect Your Family, Test Your Home!

A Message from Renville County Public Health

adon is a concern in Minnesota, as two out of every five homes have elevated levels of radon. Renville County is considered a high level county, with over 70% of properties tested having levels greater than or equal to 4 pCi/L (picocuries of radon per liter of air).

Nationwide, radon is estimated to cause 21,000 cases of lung cancer each year. Exposure to radon increases your risk of lung cancer from breathing in radon gas over a period of time. This colorless, odorless gas is a threat because homes can draw in radon gas through the soil beneath the foundation, leading to accumulating radon levels in the home.

Radon can migrate into any type of home foundation, whether it be a basement, slab on grade, crawl space, or manufactured home. It may also be present regardless of soil type, age, presence of an air exchanger, or presence of a mitigation system. Since 2009, all new home construction has required at minimum a passive radon reduction system. During real estate transactions, sellers must disclose any prior radon testing.

Testing is the only way to determine radon levels in your home, with winter being the best time to test. Testing should be done in the lowest level of your home. The basement is often the best choice, especially if you spend eight or more hours a week using the basement. Testing is easy to do and can be done in three to seven days. The kit is sent to a laboratory and results returned to you. Testing for radon is recommended to be done every five years. Test kits can be purchased from hardware stores, or a licensed professional can be contacted to perform testing. Renville County Public Health also has test kits available at no cost while supplies last.

Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recommend that if the radon level in your home is above 4 pCi/L, that steps are taken to reduce the radon level.

Mitigation costs typically range from \$1,500 to \$2,500 depending on type; financial assistance may be available, with resources on MDH's webpage. MDH conducts free inspections of radon mitigation systems installed after June 1, 2020 to assure they are installed correctly and meeting minimum requirements; contact the MDH Indoor Air Unit to request an inspection

Renville County Sheriff's Office Offers FREE Prescription Drug Take Back Program



The Prescription Drug Take Back Program aims to safely collect and destroy expired or unused medications with a goal of reducing drug crimes/addiction and keeping children safe by reducing the chances of accidental overdoses. This program is free to Renville County residents. Simply remove or black out your name on the container labels, bring your medications to one of the collections sites, and place them into the tamper-proof container! Medications collected are destroyed at an approved incinerator. **Questions? Contact the Renville County Sheriff's Office at 320-523-1161.**

What Kinds of Medication Can I Dispose of?

YES: Prescription Medications, Prescription Patches, Prescription Ointments, Over-the-Counter Medications, Vitamins, Medication Samples, Veterinary Drugs

NO: Needles, Inhalers, Aerosol Cans, Thermometers, Hydrogen Peroxide, Lotions, Medication from Businesses (Medical or Dental Clinics)

Renville County Tax Abatement - Building Incentive Program

Goal: To encourage new construction of residential properties in Renville County and encourage replacement of dilapidated housing structures that may not be suitable to live in.

Program Outline: Eligible applicants may qualify for county and/or city property tax abatement for residential properties built within Renville County boundaries. This will include single family homes and multi-family residential units. This policy shall have limitations on taxable value per property, as well as the total aggregate amount that can be abated in any given year for all properties (as budgeted and approved by the County Board).



 Newly constructed single-family residences may receive abatement of up to \$200,000 in assessed value for up to five (5) years.

Example: Bird Island home assessed at \$195,900 pays \$3,200/year in property taxes – not including assessments. If the city would also choose to abate the taxes, the total tax incentive over five (5) years for this home would be \$16,000.

• Multi-family residences may receive the same \$200,000 assessed value five-year property tax abatement, plus an additional \$10,000 assessed value per additional unit. (For example: a 4-unit apartment complex may qualify for up to \$230,000 in assessed value property tax abatement).

Abatement will be in the form of a tax rebate calculated by the County Auditor-Treasurer after timely payment of regular property tax payment is made. This abatement does not apply to any penalty or interest due resulting from late or delinquent payment of property taxes.

Eligibility:

- 1) Property must be located within Renville County.
- 2) Project is built to building codes adopted at the time building permit is obtained.
- 3) Property taxes must be current at time of application.
- 4) Applicant must apply for abatement prior to the start of construction.
- 5) Abatement may transfer with the sale of the property for the balance of the original five-year abatement period.
- 6) Abatement does not apply to or include any existing or new special assessments to the property.
- 7) Each Renville County city will have its own guidelines on if they allow abatement of their portion of their taxes.

Renville County Assessor's Office: Notice of Valuation and Classification




The Renville County Assessor's Office maintains records on the physical characteristics of each property in the county. This includes analyzing a property's location, amount of land owned, square footage of improvements, and quality of construction. As required by state law, the Assessor's Office is responsible for recording any changes to your property as well. Appraisers from the Assessor's Office verify classification of properties — whether a property is classified as residential, commercial, or agricultural. Appraisers are also responsible for maintaining homestead records and receiving and processing homestead applications.

The Assessor's Office uses sales data to estimate the market value of properties on the assessment date of January 2 each year. Each spring, you will be mailed a Notice of Valuation and Classification. This notice will inform you of the market value and the classification of your property. If you have any questions regarding your property's value, classification, or homestead status, please contact the Assessor's Office at 320-523-3645.


